**Subject:** our SB 611 rules discussion this afternoon

Senator Hass,

Thanks again for your time today to discuss the SB 611 rules.

As we discussed, Staff's understanding is that the Legislature chose to involve the OPUC in the implementation of SB 611 to provide help in areas in which the OPUC has expertise. Our goal in defining broadband is to be consistent with our general understanding of the term, and consistent with the legislative intent underlying SB 611. "Broadband" may be used interchangeably with "high speed internet", but the Commission will need a more specific definition on speed to effectively apply the law to applications it may receive. Staff supports a definition that reflects a certain speed of "high speed internet", which is consistent with the common usage of the term, and, the legislative intent behind the bill.

Staff has proposed a draft definition that includes a minimum download speed of 10 Mbps, using the FCC speed "buckets" for reporting purposes. We chose this speed as it represents the speed above which the majority (69 percent) of Oregon customers receive internet service, reflecting the current state of broadband in Oregon. Specifically, Staff has included the following language in its proposed SB 611 rules:

"Broadband service" means the provision of data transmission technology that provides twoway data transmission to and from the Internet with a download speed equal to or greater than 10 megabits per second (Mbps).
