#### Need for the Rule(s):

The Public Utility Commission supervises and regulates investor-owned energy utilities in Oregon, acts to protect utility customers and the general public from unjust and unreasonable exactions and practices, and obtains for customers adequate service at fair and reasonable rates. See ORS 756.040. Currently PUC regulated energy utilities may and do implement, in various forms on a voluntary basis, a severe weather moratorium on disconnection for nonpayment. The proposed rule will standardize the manner and means by which regulated energy utilities refrain from disconnecting residential service for nonpayment during periods of extreme heat or cold.

#### **Fiscal and Economic Impact:**

The fiscal and economic impact of the proposed rule will depend upon the severity of the weather. Members of the public whose PUC regulated utility service would otherwise be disconnected for nonpayment in severe weather may be impacted in a number of ways. Requiring a utility to keep service connected may result in a larger utility bill balance for the customer. On the other hand, preventing disconnection during severe weather may shield the customer from other expenses associated with dealing with the loss of a utility service, such as a reconnection fee, the procurement of an alternative heat source, an alternative housing location, or medical expenses for treatment of any health impacts associated with exposure to extreme temperatures. Any resulting increase in the outstanding balance of the utility customer may affect the utility's ability to collect the full balance, and as a result, the utility may incur an increase in associated collection expense. The Commission expects any such increase to be minimal given the anticipated short duration of any moratorium.

# **Statement of Cost of Compliance:**

# 1. Impact on state agencies, units of local government and the public (ORS 183.335(2)(b)(E)):

There is no known cost-of-compliance impact on any state or local government agencies. PUC-regulated energy utilities will incur some administrative, recordkeeping, training, and labor costs to implement and document severe weather moratoriums in accordance with the proposed rule. The PUC does not anticipate that the costs of compliance for these energy utilities to be significant because the energy utilities already administer some type of severe weather moratorium on a voluntary basis.

#### 2. Cost of compliance effect on small business (ORS 183.336):

a. Estimate the number of small business and types of businesses and industries with small businesses subject to the rule: There are no small businesses subject to this proposed rule. This rule will apply to PUC-regulated electric and gas utilities.

# b. Projected reporting, recordkeeping and other administrative activities required for compliance, including costs of professional services:

Regulated energy utilities subject to this proposed rule will incur some administrative, recordkeeping, and training costs to develop, implement, and document a severe weather moratorium consistent with the rule and to notify PUC staff of the utility's preferred weather reporting stations, and about any subsequent changes to the preferred weather reporting station.

## c. Equipment, supplies, labor and increased administration required for compliance:

Energy utilities subject to this proposed rule will likely allocate some labor and administrative resources to develop, implement, and document a severe weather moratorium consistent with the rule. The PUC does not anticipate the need for the increased labor and administrative resources to be significant given that the affected utilities already administer some type of severe weather moratorium on a voluntary basis.

# How were small businesses involved in the development of this rule?

Small businesses were not specifically involved in the development of this rule. PUC Staff conducted a workshop and solicited informal comments from a broad group of stakeholders, including the energy utilities that would be subject to the rule, the Community Action Partnership of Oregon (CAPO), and the Oregon Citizens' Utility Board (CUB).

# Severe Weather Moratorium on Involuntary Disconnection of Residential Electric or Gas Utility Service

- (1) Except as set forth in section (8) of this rule, an energy utility must put into effect a moratorium on the disconnection of residential service for nonpayment on any day a high temperature of less than 32 degrees is forecast by the applicable weather reporting service.
- (2) An electric utility must put into effect a moratorium on the disconnection of residential service for nonpayment on any day a local Heat Advisory is issued by the applicable weather reporting service.
- (3) Any moratorium activated as a result of section (1) or section (2) of this rule must remain in effect at least through the start of the next business day.
- (4) An energy utility must base the need for a moratorium on data available from the National Weather Service or another weather reporting service that may be designated by the utility.
- (5) An energy utility need only apply a moratorium to the geographic area that meets the conditions in section (1) and section (2) of this rule.
- (6) The energy utility must obtain the required forecast data no later than 8:00 a.m. each business day.
- (7) Each energy utility must notify the Commission's Consumer Services Section which weather reporting service it will utilize in each geographic area served by the utility in complying with the requirements of this rule; and the energy utility must notify the Commission's Consumer Services Section upon choosing a different weather reporting service.
- (8) The temperature threshold specified in section (1) of this rule is 25 degrees if an energy utility offers a winter protection program under which a household with an unemancipated minor under the age of 18, an individual age 65 or older, or an infirm person may participate and be protected from service disconnection from December through February. For purposes of this section, "infirm person" refers to an individual having a condition of weakness or illness that affects the individual's ability to maintain a state of health when exposed to extreme temperatures.
