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## Introduction 1

2	Q:	Please state your name, office address, and present position with the Oregon Water			
3		Resources Department ("WRD").			
4	A.	My name is Mary Grainey. My office address is 725 Summer Street NE, Suite A, Salem,			
5		Oregon 97301. My present position is Hydroelectric Program Coordinator.			
6	Qua	lifications			
7	Q:	Briefly describe your educational background and professional experience.			
8	A:	I have a Bachelors of Engineering Degree from the Illinois Institute of Technology and a			
9		Masters of Engineering Degree from the University of Washington in Civil Engineering.			
10		I am a registered Professional Engineer and Certified Water Rights Examiner with the			
11		State of Oregon. I was employed with the Oregon Department of Energy for five years			
12		and then with WRD for more than 22 years.			
13	Q:	Briefly describe the scope of your duties with WRD.			
14	A:	As Hydroelectric Program Coordinator I am responsible for processing water right			
15		applications for both major and minor projects. My duties include applying the rules of			
16		ORS 543 to new project applications and ORS 543A to projects seeking relicensing. I			
17		prepare proposed orders and proposed water right documents for approval or denial of			
18		project applications. I represent WRD on oversight committees once a project has been			
19		authorized or reauthorized. I am also responsible for assessing annual fees to the water			
20		rights holders for their projects.			
21	Pur	pose of Testimony			
22	Q:	What is the purpose of your testimony?			
23	A:	I will describe fees that are assessed on hydroelectric projects under Oregon statutes, and			
24		an estimate of those fees for the J.C. Boyle Hydroelectric Project if it is issued a			
25		reauthorized water right by WRD.			
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## **Q**: What authorization from WRD is required for the Klamath River Hydroelectric 1 **Project?** 2 The original hydroelectric water right for the J.C. Boyle Hydroelectric Project expired A: 3 December of 2006, and PacifiCorp is required under Oregon law (ORS 543A) to obtain a 4 reauthorized water right in order to continue operation of the dam and powerhouse. 5 PacifiCorp has filed an application for a reauthorized water right. J.C. Boyle is now 6 operating under a temporary extension of the water right. 7 **Fees Assessed Hydroelectric Projects** 8 On what basis are fees assessed for hydroelectric projects under Oregon statutes? 0: 9 Annual fees are assessed based on the maximum theoretical horsepower ("THP") A: 10 available at the hydropower project site. Before reauthorization, \$0.28 per THP is 11 assessed pursuant to ORS 543A.415. Upon reauthorization, an annual fee of \$0.405 per 12 THP (in 1998 dollars and adjusted annually for inflation) is assessed in accordance with 13 ORS 543.078. The amount of THP is computed by multiplying the maximum amount 14 of water claimed, expressed in cubic feet per second ("cfs"), by the average total fall 15 utilized, expressed in feet, and dividing the product by 8.8. ORS 543.720(4); OAR 690-16 051-0010(35). 17 **Fees for the Klamath Hydroelectric Project** 18 **O**: What is PacifiCorp's current assessment for the J.C. Boyle portion of the project? 19 A: The amount of water claimed for power production at J.C. Boyle is 2500 cfs. The fall, or 20 head between the J.C. Boyle reservoir and powerhouse, is 463 feet. Applying the 21 formula described above to the 28 cents per THP assessed pursuant to ORS 543A.415, 22 results in a current annual fee of \$36,829.52: 23 2500 cfs \* 463 feet / 8.8 = 131,534 THP \* \$0.28 = \$36,829.52 24 25 **Q**: Will the fees be the same if the Project is reauthorized by WRD? 26

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1	A:	No, the annual fee for reauthorized projects set forth in ORS 543.078 would be applied.
2		First, the fee of \$0.405 per THP in 1998 dollars would be adjusted for inflation according
3		to "GDP-IPD". GDP-IPD is the value published for the Gross Domestic Product Implicit
4		Price Deflator by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis in
5		the publication Survey of Current Business (Table 1.1.9 (line 1) and Table C). Assuming
6		the project was reauthorized in 2012, the adjusted fee would be approximately \$0.53 per
7		THP.
8	Q:	What do you estimate the fees will be for the J.C. Boyle project if it were relicensed
9		in 2012?
10	A:	I estimate the fee for J.C. Boyle based on 2500 cfs of maximum water use, at
11		approximately \$0.53 per THP, would be \$69,713 for the year 2012.
12	Q:	Are there any additional fees that the Project could incur?
13	A:	Yes, PacifiCorp has applied for an additional 500 cfs of water use. If that additional
14		water use is approved by WRD, then the annual fee would be assessed on 3000 cfs of
15		maximum water use (157,840 THP at \$0.53 per THP), resulting in a total annual fee in
16		the year 2012 of approximately \$83,655.
17	Q:	Are the fees the same, whether the Project is relicensed by FERC or the Project is
18		decommissioned in the year 2020?
19	A:	PacifiCorp will be required to pay these annual fees for as long as the Project operates,
20		either until it is decommissioned or until the new water right expires.
21	Q:	Assuming, instead of dam removal, that the Klamath River Hydroelectric Project
22		returns to FERC relicensing – what do you estimate these fees to be for the life of
23		the new license?
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1	A:	FERC may issue a new license for a term ranging from 30 to 50 years. Applying the
2		assumptions described above, the annual fee under ORS 543.078 would be the following,
3		in 2012 dollars, for 30-year, 40-year, and 50-year license terms by way of example:
4		\$83,655 x 30 = \$2,509.650 \$83,655 x 40 = \$3,346,200
5		$83,655 \ge 4,182,750$
6		Again, these are estimates only, since the actual fee would be determined through the
7		reauthorization proceeding. Further, the annual fee per THP would be adjusted annually
8		for inflation.
9	Q:	Are these fees discussed in the direct testimony of Corey E. Scott (Exhibit PPL/300)
10		or shown in PacifiCorp's "Costs of FERC Relicensing Scenario" (Confidential
11		
12		Exhibit PPI/301)?
13	A:	They do not appear to be, although it is not clear to me whether the annual fees may be
14		included in the tax figures in the document.
15	Q:	Does this conclude your testimony?
16	A:	Yes.
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
