Weyerhaeuser Company ("Weyerhaeuser") supports the position of Commission Staff on Non-Energy Attributes, as set forth in the AR495 Staff Report, issued August 2, 2005. The Staff Report provides compelling reasons for allowing generators, rather than utilities, to own the non-energy attributes of renewable energy ("green tags"). Weyerhaeuser appreciates the opportunity to comment further on this issue.

Generators that utilize renewable or other "green" energy sources create a valuable environmental attribute of their generation that is not currently included in the calculation of PacifiCorp's or Portland General's avoided costs. The utilities' avoided costs are based on the cost of natural gas fired turbines. Therefore, if utilities are paying generators only their avoided costs, the utilities are not paying for such environmental attributes, and they should not own them.

As the Staff has recognized, the environmental attributes of such generation have evolved into a "product" that may be sold independently of the generation itself. This product does not belong to the utility. Under PURPA and state law, utilities pay QFs for energy and/or capacity, not environmental attributes. A utility such as PacifiCorp has no more right to the green tags created at a Weyerhaeuser mill than it does to the paper that is made there--if PacifiCorp wants either product, it can buy that product. Transferring QFs' green tags to a utility would be fundamentally unfair.

An important reason for allowing generators to own green tags is that such ownership encourages "green" generation. Ownership of green tags is a valuable right that encourages potential generators to meet the environmental criteria governing the sale of green tags. The value of green tags provides an incentive for generators to install environmentally beneficial generation, or operate existing generation in a manner that will meet the environmental standards on which green tags are based. If utilities automatically own green tags, that incentive is eliminated, and fewer generation resources will be "green."

Weyerhaeuser endorses the Commission Staff's proposal to promulgate a rule clarifying that the environmental attributes of generation belong to generators. As markets for green tags develop in the future, such a rule will increase in importance, not only to eliminate uncertainty, but also to encourage generators to develop renewable and

other resources that pose fewer threats to the environment.
