SUBJECT: Call to reform or terminate the Cascade Natural Gas Oregon Low Income Energy Conservation (OLIEC) program and Conservation Achievement Tariff (CAT).

This correspondence is a request that the staff of the Oregon Public Utility Commission (OPUC) and Cascade Natural Gas (CNG, Cascade) enter discussions of either: a) developing an alternate program delivery mechanism for the failed OLIEC/CAT program, or b) terminating the program. This long-lived program, which had demonstrated year-over-year success in the past, has deteriorated over the past three years into an inactive program which produced ZERO results during its most recent program year.

I do not come to this conclusion lightly. I was directly involved in the creation of the OLIEC program in 2006 while employed by Community Action Partnership of Oregon (CAPO) and, for nearly three years, helped guide the program to its initial success. While employed by CNG from 2009 until my retirement in 2018, I administered this program on behalf of the utility and was instrumental in the development of the CAT overlay. In many ways, the OLIEC/CAT program was my baby.

After providing whole-home weatherization services to an average of over 50 low income households per year for 14 consecutive years, the five Community Action Agencies (CAA) that deliver the program recorded a total of ZERO completions in their most recent program year, ONE completion for the previous program year, and THREE completions the year before that! This delivery failure stands in stark contrast to the relatively consistent level of completions achieved through NW Natural's Oregon Low Income Energy Efficiency program (OLIEE) which is modeled, with some modifications, on the CAT program.

In discussions with CNG and OPUC staff in regards to this failure to produce results, the five partner CAA's contend that there <u>may not be low income homes heated with natural gas in need of weatherization service</u> in their combined, expansive, service coverage area which encompasses 14 of the 18 Oregon counties east of the Cascades. This egregious rationalization is preposterous. Cascade correctly demonstrated the fallacy of this excuse through the AEG analysis which accompanies CNG's program year (PY) 2020-2021 program report. I note that Cascade's Oregon Low Income Bill Assistance (OLIBA) program has no difficulty identifying and serving hundreds of low income households with needed natural gas utility bill assistance each program year. As if more evidence is needed, attached is a copy of a recent report from the Oregon Center for Public Policy; "A Portrait of Poverty", August 7, 2020.

There are numerous other bureaucratic and administrative reasons for this weatherization program delivery failure that are common to all Oregon CAAs. Brevity prevents me from highlighting them in this transmittal. Interestingly, the five eastside agencies seem to have succumbed to them. One need look no further than to compare the recent output of the eastside Oregon CAAs with that of the westside Oregon CAAs, utilizing what could be characterized as a sister program: The NW Natural Oregon Low Income Energy Efficiency (OLIEE) program.

NW Natural's CAA partners have had no problem delivering the OLIEE program in recent years. Below are OLIEE completion numbers for four of the last five OLIEE program years. The most recent data (PY 2020-21) will be made available to the OPUC by the end of this month

The eastside agencies have been weatherizing homes in recent years --- just not natural gashomes. The westside agencies seem to be able to do both. Below is an *understated* total number of homes weatherized using funds from the following sources: DOE/WAP, ECHO, LIHEAP-WX and BPA. This total is understated as it does not include completions from Community in Action. It should also be noted that not all of these completions were in areas served by Cascade.

Cascade has done an admirable job with this program over the years energizing the agencies to begin the utilization of the program, responding quickly to the increased production and resource utilization during the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) years, and developing the CAT overlay in response to agency requests to level the playing field with other low income weatherization programs available to them. However, OLIEC/CAT has devolved into a waste of time for Cascade and OPUC staff, and is now an underutilization of customer funds. Sadly, Cascade and OPUC staff have already taken the time and put in the effort to assign ratepayer funds in preparation for achieving weatherization completions of approximately 54 homes in the current program year (PY 2021-22). Laughable.....

After fifteen years of trial, success, and now collapse, it is time for Cascade and OPUC staff, and possibly representatives from the Energy Trust of Oregon (ETO), in conjunction with the development of a moderate income weatherization program, to initiate serious discussions into the future of OLIEC/CAT. These discussions would be most timely as we are now entering the third month of PY 2021-2022. My recommendation would be to focus on non-CAA, direct service option including client acquisition, auditing, measure installation and final inspection. With regard to client acquisition, it should be remembered that a large number of Cascade's Oregon customers qualify for assistance through the OLIBA program each year; 260 customers during PY 2020-21 alone. Customers receiving OLIBA payments are eligible for low income weatherization. Could it be that a number of them might be interested in having their homes weatherized?

For whatever reason, the five eastside agencies have not supported the OLIEC/CAT program as their westside associate agencies have the OLIEE program. It's time for Cascade and the OPUC to *quickly* work collaboratively to either remedy this situation with a new program delivery design or eliminate the program altogether and work to find alternate ways to assist low income customers.

That said there certainly could be room for a continued CAA weatherization presence alongside a new alternate delivery model. Further, agency completions under the existing OLIEC/CAT program during PY 2021-22 would be most welcome by the Company and by the low income customers affected.

It also goes without saying that Cascade should continue to fund and support the Oregon Low Income Bill Assistance program and make sure sufficient funds are available for bill assistance in these years of increasing natural gas rates.

If it turns out that a workable alternative to the CAA-only delivery model cannot be developed, then surplus OLIEC/CAT funds should be refunded to ratepayers to help offset increasing natural gas rates, and OLIEC/CAT program operations ceased.

This annual report covers both the Oregon Low Income Energy Conservation (OLIEC or Weatherization) program and the Conservation Achievement Tariff (CAT). The OLIEC program is Cascade's long-standing Oregon low-income weatherization program. The CAT bridges the gap between rebates derived from the avoided cost of natural gas and the total installed cost of eligible weatherization work.

Public Purpose Charge

Since May 2006, Cascade Natural Gas Corporation (Cascade or the Company) has collected public purpose funds to reduce the energy burden of low-income homeowners and renters in its Oregon service territory by providing them weatherization and bill assistance services. The funding is collected through a Public Purpose Charge (PPC) applied to residential, commercial, and core industrial customers' bills. As part of a settlement agreement adopted in Docket UG 287, effective February 1, 2016, all program funding comes from the PPC.

PPC monies are collected monthly to fund the weatherization efforts of the Community Action Agencies serving qualified low-income households. Interest accruals to the PPC account were discontinued in January of 2019 and the account was modified to a balancing account versus a pure deferral account (UM 1980). This helps prevent funds from accruing at a rate that exceeded monthly Agency expenditures. This change was made to Agencies (CAAs or Agencies) in Cascade's service area. All monies are held in a dedicated account and are provided to the CAAs upon completion of rebate-qualified energy efficiency improvements.

During PY 2020-21, the Company continued to follow Staff's recommendation to collect and expend a maximum of **0.625%** of gross revenues on an annual basis for the low-income weatherization programs. This cap has been in place since the implementation of a permanent CAT program in PY 2016-17. The limit was chosen as a close equivalent to the electric utilities' collections for low-income weatherization plus a 0.025% premium for the higher costs of serving rural areas.

The PUC-approved funding methodology resulted in a combined PY 2020-21 OLIEC and CAT budget of \$416,741. Due to an excess of funds in the OLIEC/CAT account for the program year, annual PPC collections were switched to "negative deposits" in the amount of -\$54,180.68. Funds resulting from these deposits were transferred to Cascade's OR low-income bill assistance account. The OLIEC/CAT account ended PY 2020-21 with a balance of \$433,031, which included a \$10,830 admin adjustment to balance a previously recorded payment for Project 19-02 to NeighborImpact.

The Company anticipates a combined PY 2021-22 budget of \$433,567, reflecting the formula recommended by Staff.

Overview of the 2020-2021 Program Year

Cascade has completed the fifteenth year of its Oregon Low Income Energy Conservation program. OLIEC is designed to increase energy efficiency in low-income households within Cascade's Oregon service area by providing rebates for the installation of select weatherization and conservation

measures following the completion of a home energy evaluation performed by a qualifying Low-Income, 501c3 organization or a CAA. The rebates are based on the Company's most recently acknowledged avoided cost of natural gas. The OLIEC program provides incentives for ten specific measures. In addition to the OLIEC rebates, agencies receive an additional \$225 for administrative and direct program costs incurred.

The CAT overlay provides a complementary mechanism for the total rebate for installing each measure to cover 100 percent of the cost of each measure. In total, agencies can receive rebates of up to 100 percent of the cost of installing OLIEC-qualified measures plus \$225 for their associated administrative and direct program costs. The program also provides a flat fee of \$550 for an audit and \$300 for an inspection of a dwelling treated under the CAT. Total funds per an OLIEC and CAT project are capped at \$10,000.

Under the OLIEC Program, CAAs installing qualifying energy efficiency measures for Cascade's Oregon low-income customers are reimbursed according to a schedule of incentive payments based on Cascade's avoided costs as stated in Schedule 33, Oregon Low-Income Energy Conservation Program. Cascade's participating agencies include:

- ➤ NeighborImpact, serving Cascade customers in the Bend/Redmond/Prineville Area
- Community Action Program East Central Oregon (CAPECO), serving Cascade customers in the Pendleton/Umatilla Area
- ➤ Community Connection of NE Oregon (CCNO), serving Cascade customers in Baker City
- ➤ Community In Action (CINA) serving Cascade customers in Malheur County; and
- Oregon Human Development Corporation (OHDC) serving Cascade customers in Northern Klamath County.

The OLIEC (non-CAT) portion of the Company's weatherization program is designed to provide reimbursements scaled to the current avoided costs of natural gas. However, the rebates associated with the OLIEC program are not intended to meet the Agency's entire cost of installing approved energy efficiency measures. This differs from Cascade's Enhanced Weatherization Incentive Program (EWIP) in Washington State, which is designed to cover the total installed cost of weatherization work performed on behalf of Cascade customers, including a program coordination fee of 15% of total project cost billed to the Company, and an additional agency indirect rate of 10% of the total project cost billed to the Company.

Cascade worked with the Agencies, Staff, and other key stakeholders to develop the CAT mechanism as a means of meeting the unique challenges of low-income natural gas weatherization. The CAT was introduced to bridge the gap between what could be covered under the parameters of the traditional OLIEC program, and the full cost incurred by the Agency delivering weatherization services to natural gas customers of Cascade Natural Gas. However, barriers to full program participation remain significant and the Company will explore alternative delivery methods for OLIEC/CAT monies in PY 21-22.

In program year **PY 2020-21, zero** households received weatherization services through OLIEC/CAT. In the previous program year, only a single home was served, resulting in a total savings of **346** therms. The ending balance for **PY 2020-21** was **\$433,031**. This reflects redirected funding to bill

assistance, along with a second adjustment associated with Project 19-02 in the amount of \$10,830, accounting for an over-correction from the previous year.

Cascade and PUC Staff have reached out to the agencies and representatives serving low-income communities in Oregon to determine barriers to participation. Feedback from Agencies indicated that there may not be weatherization-qualified natural gas homes in need of service. In order to better understand the population of income-qualified natural gas households, the Company partnered with AEG in Summer of 2021 to conduct analysis on low and near-low income customers in Cascade's Oregon service area. The resultant data and reporting from AEG's analysis can be found as attachments to this report.

For the purpose of the analysis conducted by AEG, low-income was defined as 200% of federal poverty level (FPL). This income qualification is compatible with the qualifying income level of Oregon's Low Income Weatherization Assistance Program. Moderate income was defined as above 200% of FPL, but below median state income. To determine where these households were located, address data from Cascade residential accounts was mapped to corresponding geographic blocks in the census data. Each block was then processed to analyze average household size and income, producing a distribution of households into income categories where Cascade customers reside.

Low-income households were calculated as representing 18% of all Cascade customers in Oregon. Moderate income households represented an additional 36% of Cascade's residential customer base in the state. In total, this means that over half of Cascade's customers are below median income. This significant finding suggests an existing base of customers that could benefit from Weatherization or other low and near low-income energy efficiency services. Understanding how to serve these households begins with an assessment of the building stock these customers occupy.

Low income households in Cascade's service area were identified as having the oldest housing stock, with the average year of construction being 1958. Moderate income households appeared to reside in the newest housing stock, with the average construction year being 1969. Households above median income resided, on average, in homes built in 1961. Interestingly, low-income customers were also identified as having the lowest therm usage within Cascade's service area, followed by moderate income, then households above median income.

AEG anticipates that differences in gas use per household correlate with differences in average home size. However, home size and building shell alone do not account for all the intensity differences. It was also noted that overall insulation and infiltration levels appear similar between income levels. This suggests that there could be additional factors at play such as lower income households heating less of their home, or otherwise limiting their energy consumption below comfortable levels in order to manage household expenses.

In addition to gaining a better understanding of energy intensity and building stock by income, AEG also was able to develop a heat map of low and near-low income populations by concentration across Cascade's service area. Findings indicate varied distribution between the more and less rural areas served by the Company. These maps are available as Exhibit D to this report. Cascade intends to utilize the low and near-low income data identified by AEG to better understand how to reach both low and moderate income customers in need of energy efficiency services.

As of Fall 2021, the Company has held preliminary meetings with the Energy Trust of Oregon, and has shared AEG's findings as part of a discussion on how near-low income customers can be reached by existing Energy Trust services. The Company also intends to meet with PUC Staff, the Energy Trust, and its Low Income agencies to discuss tariff revisions that allow more flexible delivery of energy efficiency services to economically vulnerable households. Cascade may also consider aligning the OLIEC program closer to the Company's E-WIP program if deemed appropriate by Oregon regulators. Other options may include adjusting the tariff to allow funding for non-weatherization projects that increase the energy efficiency of natural gas households on a pre-approved basis.

Whole-home weatherization remains a priority, and the low-income agencies that currently qualify under the tariff would retain first right of refusal to OLIEC/CAT monies. However, due to program inactivity over the last several years, the Company believes opening the program to other forms of efficiency activities and additional non-profits delivering energy efficiency services to low-income households is essential to ensuring the accruing OLIEC/CAT funds are invested in communities, rather than sitting unspent in an account.

Customer Eligibility

The agencies performing weatherization services use the same income eligibility requirements as the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). Customers are eligible for assistance through the OLIEC program if they are owners or renters of a single-family home that uses natural gas as the primary space heating fuel and if their household income does not exceed 60% of Oregon's median income, or other income threshold guidelines followed by federal low-income weatherization programs. Duplexes, triplexes and four-plex apartments qualify for OLIEC if residents of at least half the units in the structure meet the income qualification test.

The OLIEC/CAT program provides additional funding to supplement existing funding provided by low-income weatherization programs governed by federal and state authorities. These existing programs give preference to homes occupied by the elderly, the disabled and to low-income households with children ages 6-years and younger. Under its current structure, the CAT also enables the Company to fund weatherization efforts performed by CAPs and other low-income 501c3 agencies (described below) at 100% of their cost up to the cost-effective limit. This adaptation of the CAT has proven essential to clearing a path forward to ensure low-income households in Cascade's service area receive essential weatherization services and allows greater programmatic flexibility while ensuring stringent standards of safety and quality are maintained.

Dispersal of Funding and Participation by Agency

Participating Agencies have access to weatherization monies that accrue in a Cascade-held account which is funded based on the total funding provided by Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS) under the LIHEAP program within Cascade's service territory. Cascade has the discretion to revise the allocation during the year if the Company believes an alternative allocation is a more effective and efficient use of the available funds. The program also has the discretion to transfer funds between agencies, as needed. The PY 2020-21 allocations were:

Actual Agency accomplishments for PY 2020-21 were 0 homes served, so no additional breakout by agency has been provided in this year's report.

Payment Process

Each Agency completes and returns Cascade's rebate application forms. The rebate amounts are calculated based on the deemed savings per measure published in the Company's Tariff Sheet No. 33. Additional measure funding is covered through the CAT mechanism in accordance with Schedule 33 in the Company's Tariff. The rebate form is initially signed by the Agency representative and sent to Cascade along with all the receipts, invoices, and the energy savings analysis. The Energy Efficiency and Community Outreach department next reviews each rebate application form to ensure all paperwork is correct and valid. Finally, the approved form goes to the Accounting department for payment to the appropriate Agency at which time the Agency's fund balance is reduced.

With the introduction of CAT, the Company initiated an electronic funds transfer mechanism which provides funds much more quickly to the Agencies. The intent of this modification, developed at agency request, is to enable the Agencies to have the funds in hand prior to paying the contractor's invoice on each qualified OLIEC job.

Designated Fund for Additional CAP Agency and Other 501c3 Agencies Energy Efficiency Efforts

As included in the OLIEC tariff effective on January 20, 2010, Cascade was allowed to designate \$25,000 of the OLIEC program funds for use by CAAs and 501c3 non-profit agencies for reimbursement of the installation costs of selected energy efficiency measures (high efficiency gas furnaces and water heaters and construction to ENERGY STAR® standards) and custom low-income energy efficiency projects (where preference would be given to measures that would qualify for rebate in similar projects offered through Energy Trust of Oregon (Energy Trust).

To date, no reimbursements have been made from this designated fund. The primary problem Cascade has encountered with the utilization of these funds is that Agencies performing this type of work are already connected to the Energy Trust. In the same sense that low-income households would qualify for either the standard incentives available to all customers on a qualified rate schedule or the income-specific rebates designed to facilitate more substantial conservation services; the 501c3 agencies also have the choice of participating through the low-income specific program with higher reimbursement levels or receiving a rebate from Energy Trust. It should be noted the funds for both programs are provided through the same source: Cascade customers. Since either program enables Cascade to count therm savings toward annual goals, the Company is neutral as to which source of funding the low-income agencies pursue. That being said, the low-income program was specifically designed as an opportunity to provide *greater* funding to best serve Cascade's vulnerable populations.

The Company has discussed these challenges with PUC Staff and the Energy Trust and looks forward to continuing discussions in PY 21-22 on how to reconcile their new construction program serving non-profit entities with the language in Cascade's tariff. It's likely that the compatibility of these programs can be resolved as part of the tariff changes and coordination efforts discussed earlier in this report.

Program Results

The OLIEC program received no uptake from qualified weatherization agencies in 2020-21, and only 1 household was served the previous year.

Based on the anticipated PY 2021-22 funding level of \$433,567, and the current per-project measure cost average of ~\$8,000, the Company estimates that approximately 54 homes could be served this coming year. However, it's unlikely the Agencies will utilize these funds unless significant changes are made to the design of the weatherization program. As stated earlier, Cascade plans to meet with PUC Staff and other key stakeholders to determine how to best reach low-income customers in light of continued barriers to participation.

Accompanying this report are the following four exhibits that will provide further insights into program performance for both OLIEC and CAT:

- Exhibit A summarizes the results of the program for each year of the OLIEC program beginning with Program Year 18-19.
- Exhibit B displays the monthly financial metrics for the OLIEC / CAT program beginning with Program Year 18-19, and reflects the cumulative non-PPC admin adjustment of \$40,945.47 for program-related administrative expenses charged to general Cascade admin as described on page 9 of the PY 18-19 annual report.
- Exhibit C displays data relating to the numbers of measures installed through the OLIEC/CAT program and the resulting predicted therm savings for each measure and each year of operation.
- Exhibit D shares the AEG findings regarding low and near-low income populations in Cascade's Oregon service area.

The format of the first three exhibits to this report have been refreshed for PY 2021. All previous reporting data is available as part of previous years' reports and has also been archived by the Company for PUC review. However, as of the PY 2020-21 report, the Company has narrowed the scope of reporting to the last 3 program years.

Year-End Balance

At the end of PY 2020-21, the program account had a balance of \$433,030.64 as opposed to \$476,380.94 at the end of PY 2019-20. If funds remain unspent in the coming program year, the

Company will continue to redirect weatherization monies to bill assistance, or return surplus funds beyond those designated for weatherization back to Cascade customers.

Program Outreach

Ongoing emails and discussion took place in Program Year 2020-21. The Company intends to engage with its Agencies, the Energy Trust and PUC staff in the coming PY to explore how to restructure the program to better direct funds to benefit energy efficiency in low-income gas households.

Conclusion

PY 2020-21 has demonstrated the resounding need for new approaches to serving low-income gas households. Cascade will begin by revisiting the tariff design and limitations to program funding per-project which may be inhibiting participation in more rural areas. The Company will also look towards alternative models to direct funds on a per-project basis for non-weatherization services that reduce energy consumption in income-qualified natural gas households.





- ☑ Differences in gas use per household correlate with differences in average home size, but home size and building shell alone do not account for all the intensity difference
- Overall insulation and infiltration levels are similar between income levels, in contrast to Cascade's WA territory.
 - R-values for roof/attic, walls, and floors are within +/- 1
 - Average low/moderate income air infiltration is actually lower (better) than abovemedian income homes, which may be the effect of targeted programs



History

Cascade Natural Gas Corporation's (Cascade's or the Company's) Oregon Low Income Bill Assistance (OLIBA) program was first implemented in May 2006 with the Public Utility Commission of Oregon (OPUC) approval of the Company's Schedule 31, "Public Purposes Funding" (now called the "Public Purpose Charge").

The Oregon Low-Income Bill Assistance (OLIBA) program was designed to supplement the Federal Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) by providing additional financial assistance to income-eligible households in Cascade's service territory. When the Public Purpose Charge was established, 0.29 percent of Oregon residential and commercial gross billing revenues were dedicated to the program. The percentage is updated annually to meet the requirements of programs funded by the Public Purpose Charge. At the beginning of this program year, the program had a budget increase of \$63,911 that was collected from customers at a rate of 0.097% of all core customers' billing revenues.

Program Results

Since the inception of the program in May 2006, a total of 3205 energy assistance pledges have been provided totaling \$880,115 in direct payments to residential customers. During the 2020-2021 Program Year, the Community Action agencies (CAAs or Agencies) in Cascade's service territory distributed \$101,354 of OLIBA funds to 260 households.

2020-2021 Program Year Results

The 2020-2021 Program Year marks the 15th full year of the OLIBA program. Public Purpose Charge collections for OLIBA funding this Program Year totaled \$94,713. With a carryover balance of \$-14,537, total program funding was \$80,176. \$24,776 was used to pay Agencies' costs for program administration. \$101,354 was credited to 260 customers at an average pledge of \$390. Pledge spending was allowed to exceed the funding level by \$45,954 in response to the needs of our customers during the COVID-19 pandemic and because the account is a deferral account which provides a simple method of recovery.

Table 1 below provides statistics on the program's performance on a month by month basis.

OLIBA Funding to Agencies

The full fund balance is available to all Agencies at the first of each month to use as need demands. Because the fund is deferred, all pledges submitted for qualifying customers will be honored and the collection rate will be adjusted at the end of the program year should spending exceed the available funding level.

Payment Process

Cascade uses a cashless voucher payment system where OLIBA allocations to Agencies and grants made to customers are made without a transfer of actual cash between the Company and Agencies. This process has proven to be efficient for all participants. Cascade believes that this process ensures customers receive their assistance payments in a timely manner.

Agency Coordination

The Company believes the program is working well. We coordinate with the Agencies via teleconference to ensure that any new issues needing consideration or resolution are given a proper forum. Issues we discuss include timely processing of customer pledges, adherence to program guidelines, OLIBA funding, and reaching applicable customers.

I. Summary

The programs supported by the Oregon Low Income Energy Efficiency Program (OLIEE) tariff managed to continue in light of the many challenges in the 2019-20 program year. Collectively our partner agencies completed 248 weatherization projects and engaged several hundred additional NW Natural customers through energy education workshops, energy saver kits and/or received air sealing services.

II. OLIEE Overview

Since October 2002, NW Natural (NWN) has collected public purpose funding for its Oregon Low-Income Energy Efficiency program (OLIEE). That rate started at one quarter of one percent (0.25%). During the 2017-18 program year the collection increased to one fifty-fifth of one percent (0.55%) total energy use billed from Oregon's residential and commercial customers. Due to a recognized need, and increase in project potential, project costs, and measures, collection was adjusted again in the 2019-20 program year and to equal to one eighty-fifth of one percent (0.85%) starting on January 1, 2020.

The OLIEE program assists NWN's low income customers by reducing their natural gas needs through the installation of high-efficient gas equipment and weatherization. The program also empowers customers through energy literacy in conjunction with weatherization as well as a stand-alone service. The program is applicable to dwellings occupied by customers who meet income guidelines as established in Oregon's annual Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) State Plan¹. On average, the OLIEE program reduces participating customers' gas usage by approximately 20%² annually.

III. OLIEE Community Action Program (CAP) Program

OLIEE partners with CAP Agencies in each county to administer the OLIEE program. These agencies utilize matching funds derived from the Office of Community Services' Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and the US Department of Energy's Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP). NWN contributes to each eligible gas home's weatherization and energy efficiency efforts as follows:



Targets: At the start of the 2019-20 program year, the program had a goal of maintaining 300 agency served households each year. Installation costs, agency metrics and revenue forecasts resulted in a project forecast of 306. Prior to COVID, agency feedback was positive towards an increase production in conjunction with additional outreach efforts. 2020 did not go as envisioned. Most agencies suspended all work in response to COVID. Additionally, the fire season of 2020 impacted agency operations and working conditions. These combined impacts resulted in that target not being met by September 30, 2020.

Those agencies have reliably met their quotas in previous years and without COVID, it is likely the OLIEE program would have met or exceeded the 2019-20 target.

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VI. Program Funding⁴

Including the 2020 tariff changes that increased the per dwelling total, average project cost still dropped \$25 to approximately \$8,453 during the 2019-20 program year (inclusive of administrative, audit and inspection costs). This is likely due to the project timeline; existing projects did not adjust to a mid-year change. Additionally, fewer whole home retrofits were completed due to COVID restrictions, and there was an increase in the number of equipment-only projects in response to 2020 conditions.

Funding is based on October 1 – September 30 Program Year, which is the same time period project completions are counted. Funding is billed and recorded (as shown below) but not collected or deposited until the start of the following month. Interest is also paid the month following when it was earned.

Project completions are by date of agency completion, not by date of receipt or processing by NW Natural. Expenses are tracked on a cash basis. The one-month offset in the chart below is a result of these factors.

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VII. Energy Education

The current tariff allows 10% of program collections to be used for client energy education each program year but the program distributed under 5% to prioritize weatherization. The Company's goal is to create synergies in the delivery and funding of traditional low-income services - weatherization and bill assistance – while better serving this customer group. By targeting customers on the weatherization wait lists (OLIEE) and previous recipients of bill assistance (OLGA⁶), NWN specifically hopes to:

- Provide more immediate attention and services to customers on weatherization wait lists.
- Provide education and direct install measures to customers whose homes do not qualify for OUFF
- Show OLGA customers how to use less gas and decrease their dependency on bill payment assistance.
- Encourage eligible households to sign up for weatherization services.

Based on Agency and OAC feedback, NW Natural will continue to support the utilization of Energy Education to find ways to support outreach efforts and enhance waitlist management. A few agency-specific charts are included in Appendix 1.

NW Natural is pleased with the agency efforts and seeks to foster inter-agency collaboration to help create an even stronger education program.

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VIII. OLIEE: Open Solicitation Program (OSP) Overview

The OLIEE Tariff seeks to serve all low-income households and allows the Company to partner with organizations serving a similar demographic as the CAP to identify projects that meet the same program intent while providing some diversification of housing stock and, hence, tenant profiles. These projects all fall within the scope of the Open Solicitation Program of the OLIEE tariff.

In 2019-20 the Company prioritized existing agencies and enacting the January 1, 2020 tariff change. There are no active OSP projects. No OSP projects were awarded in the 2019-20 or the 2018-19 Program Years.

NW Natural plans to develop OSP guidelines and hopes to open for proposals to ensure carry-over funding is utilized in a timely manner. The OAC will be provided updates on progress in 2021.

IX. Program Oversight

The OLIEE Advisory Committee (OAC) meets semi-annually to provide deliberation and counsel to NWN. Members include agency representatives (2), the Citizens Utility Board (CUB), the Public Utility Commission (PUC) and the Community Action Partnership of Oregon (CAPO). Northwest Energy Coalition attended OAC meetings during the 2019-20 program year. The intent of this body is to provide feedback and recommendations for program changes and performance.

In 2020 the OAC meet and discussed COVID, wildfire, program changes and the impacts those had on spending and the budget.

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X. Program Accountability

NWN solicited feedback from program partners through an anonymous 10 question survey. Results on the OLIEE program averaged 1.26 out of 1 to 5 scale where 1 was "extremely satisfied" and 5 was "not at all satisfied." Results are based on total responses of which due to COVID and timing, there were only 7 in 2020.

NWN OLIEE program staff will be looking into continual improvements and focus on "Timeliness" which had improved but slipped in 2020 with one "3" vote. NWN has been tracking the payment turn-around time starting during the 2017-18 year and has been focused on reducing processing times.

A Portrait of Poverty in Oregon

The State of Working Oregon


Before the coronavirus (COVID-19) spread to Oregon, poverty afflicted all corners of the state. More than one in 10 Oregonians lived below the federal poverty line before the coronavirus economic crisis. But that figure masks significant differences in poverty levels among different Oregon communities. Certain groups — people of color, women, Oregonians with a disability, and rural communities — face greater obstacles to rise above the federal poverty line.

Moreover, the federal definition of poverty understates the extent of economic hardship in Oregon. The poverty guidelines were originally established in the 1960s based on food prices. As such, it fails to account for the rising cost of housing, health care, child care, and other basic needs. For 2020, a family of four is considered to be living in poverty if they earn less than \$26,200 a year. 2

After months of uncertainty and economic turmoil unleashed by the pandemic, it is tempting to yearn for a return to normal. It is easy to look at our past economy with rose-colored glasses. But even before the coronavirus ground the economy to a halt, "normal" for many Oregonians meant struggling to make ends meet. A return to normal is not good enough.

of Oregonians live below the federal poverty line




of those Oregonians live in deep poverty

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The State of Working Oregon is a series of OCPP fact sheets examining Oregon's economy from the perspective of working families.

In 2018, after eight years of uninterrupted economic growth, Oregon's poverty rate stood at 13 percent, meaning that more than one in 10 Oregonians met the official definition of poverty and likely lacked one or more basic needs.³ This represents more than 516,000 Oregonians, including 134,000 children. Of those Oregonians living in poverty, four in 10 lived in what some experts refer to as "deep poverty" — income that is less than half of the poverty guideline.⁴ For a family of four in 2018, that meant trying to survive on only \$13,100 a year, or less than \$1,100 a month. That family is likely unable to adequately meet most if its basic needs.




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While poverty has ebbed and flowed over the years, Oregon's poverty rate in 2018 stood at the same level as in 1995, when the data series begins. Even during times of economic prosperity, poverty in Oregon has not dropped below 10 percent in recent decades.⁵


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Before the pandemic, Oregonians of color already confronted significant barriers to getting ahead. The nation's long history of racial oppression and exclusion, coupled with ongoing

patterns of discrimination, have meant that people of color disproportionately work in low-paying jobs and in jobs that lack stability.⁶ As a result, poverty rates in communities of color were as much as double the poverty rate for white Oregonians from 2014-2018.⁷ This means that about one in four Black, Pacific Islander, American Indian, and Latino Oregonians fell below the federal poverty threshold and were consequently denied many of the fundamental economic opportunities available to others.

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
Children are the hardest hit by poverty of any age group. From 2014-2018, Oregon's child poverty rate was nearly 18 percent, meaning that nearly one in five children in Oregon lived below the poverty line. By comparison, 14 percent of working-age adults and eight percent of seniors fell below the poverty line during that time period.⁸

Poverty among children has particularly harsh long-term consequences. Researchers have found a causal relationship between very low incomes and children's achievement in school, as well as lower earnings later in life.⁹

Historic inequities have created barriers for children of color that exacerbate their family's poverty rates. In Oregon, more than one in four American Indian and Latino children, and more than one in three Black children, lived in poor households from 2014-2018. Nationally, children of color, especially Black and American Indian children, are also much more likely to live in high-poverty neighborhoods, or what is known as concentrated poverty. This is due to historic practices like red-lining, as well as current laws and practices that replicate and reinforce past discrimination. Concentrated poverty results in these children growing up in communities that lack the resources that children need to thrive – like quality schools and safe places to play.


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During even the best of times, people experiencing disability face structural barriers to getting ahead. Federal and state law allow certain federally qualified employers to pay people experiencing disabilities a sub-minimum wage. Although the Oregon legislature recently took action to phase out this lower wage level in Oregon, workers experiencing disability will not be guaranteed the same wage floor as all other workers until 2023.

Because of structural barriers like this, over one in five people experiencing disability had income below the poverty guidelines from 2014-2018. Nearly half of Black women who are experiencing disability lived in poverty.

Women face higher poverty rates, regardless of education

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Poverty rates also differ between men and women in Oregon. From 2014-2018, the share of women experiencing poverty was 15 percent, while the poverty rate for men was less than 13 percent. This gap existed between women and men regardless of educational attainment. A higher rate of poverty among women appeared at every level of education as compared to men.

Higher poverty rates for women may be due, in part, to the fact that women's wages lag behind those of men, and women are overrepresented in industries that pay the minimum wage.¹⁵

High poverty also afflicts transgender Oregonians

While the Census does not provide options for identifying outside of the male/female binary, and does not include questions regarding sexual orientation or gender identity, a different data source shows that transgender, nonbinary, and genderqueer Oregonians face real barriers. According to the 2015 U.S. Transgender Survey, 30 percent of transgender Oregonians lived in poverty in 2015. The report said that anti-trans discrimination fueled economic disparities, with one in five trans Oregonians reporting being fired from a job because of their gender identity or expression, and nearly a third of those employed or seeking employment reporting other forms of discrimination.


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More than one in three single mothers in Oregon lived below the poverty line from 2014-2018. ¹⁷ For Black, American Indian, or Latina single mothers, that figure was one in two. In total, there were about 36,000 single mothers in Oregon trying to survive with poverty level incomes.

The high cost of child care poses a formidable barrier for single mothers seeking to rise above poverty. The average annual cost of child care at a center for an infant in Oregon is over \$14,000 a year. ¹⁸ The high cost of child care can discourage single mothers from joining the work force.

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Greater proportions of people experience poverty in Oregon's rural areas.¹⁹ From 2014-2018, the poverty rate was more than 16 percent among rural Oregonians, compared to the 14 percent rate for Oregonians living in urban areas. The highest poverty rate in Oregon is in Malheur County, where nearly one in four residents has income below the poverty level.

Rural areas have higher unemployment rates, a lower minimum wage floor, and substantially lower per capita personal income than urban areas. These factors likely contribute to higher levels of poverty.²⁰

Conclusion

Even during the best of times, Oregon has left far too many people behind. In 2018, the poverty rate in Oregon stood at the same level as it did more than two decades ago. Throughout this period, more than one in 10 Oregonians lived below the federal poverty line — itself a measure that understates real economic need. Particular populations — Oregonians of color, rural Oregonians, Oregonians experiencing disability, women, single mothers, and children — have faced bigger barriers to rise out of poverty. As Oregon charts a path out of the COVID-19 crisis, it's clear that a return to the pre-pandemic state of affairs is not good enough.

All disparities highlighted in this paper were statistically significant at the 95 percent level when compared to non-Hispanic whites. As used in this paper "communities of color" refers to all respondents who identify as something other than non-Hispanic or Latino white. Wherever possible this paper separates out data for the Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander population, referred to as "Pacific Islander." Where sample sizes were too small for reliable results, data for Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islanders were included in the "Other" category, rather than grouping them with the "Asian" category, and is noted in charts.
